Sierra Club Hike Around Agua Hedionda Lagoon in Carlsbad

Carlsbad and San Diego County face some historic choices regarding our future energy generation. This hike around the Agua Hedionda Lagoon is an opportunity to learn more about our region's energy future. Carlsbad's Climate Action Plan is currently out for review. Will the final plan include a Community Choice Energy component that would boost local renewables? Will the existing Encina power plant be replaced with another fossil fuel plant or move forward with renewable energy? This is an easy 2 mile hike on two different trails along the Agua Hedionda Lagoon. First link is the Hubbs Trail with sweeping views of the lagoon and its wildlife, as well as the existing power plant's huge concrete structure and exhaust stack.
