Today we still have land that hasn't been lost to development- open space lands that are critical to our quality of life. There is often just a short window of opportunity to acquire land prior to development. We need to be able to move quickly to secure options to preserve it, before developers lock in options to destroy it. Our land acquisition fund provides critical early funding for appraisals, option agreements and whatever is needed to lock in preservation before it is too late. Our Local Wildlife Can't Survive Without Land
